BRISBANE

The 2014/15 season saw wet weather play a significant part in fixtures with a number of games and events having to be rescheduled. We could not have managed to get all games played, if not for the tireless efforts of our Fixtures and Grading Sub Committee and grounds crew. Apart from the challenges with the weather, the year was a fantastic success.



Membership

For the third year in a row, BSA managed to maintain a small improvement in registrations of players and officials. This is a result primarily, of the popularity of slow pitch which continues to gain in numbers each year.

Sponsorship & Grants

The facilities at Downey Park are aging and are expensive to maintain. We also have the challenge of having to dismantle and handover most of our playing surfaces to another sport to run their competition over winter.

Whereas some other District Associations are very fortunate to receive direct financial or in-kind assistance from their local council or a related licensed club, the BSA does not. It is the policy of the BSA to keep fees as affordable as possible so consequently, sponsorship and grants are extremely important and the only way we can improve facilities and introduce any new programs.

Unfortunately our sponsor sold his business and retired meaning we are without a major sponsor at this time. We are still fortunate though, to have *Height 4 Hire* provide extensive services in-kind to help replace a diamond lights during the season.

We were successful in using grants from the Brisbane City Council to replace diamond lights and replace some back stops damaged by storms, a grant from the Gaming Machine Benefit Fund to purchase a new large ride on mower, and a grant from the State Government to run a number of development programs.

Representative Highlights

Brisbane nominated teams to compete in the U15 Girls and Boys, U17 Girls, U19 Women's and Open Men's and Women's (two teams) State Championships. This year the Boys team was in conjunction with the Logan Softball Association.

Our Open Red team were successful as undefeated State Champions and our U17 team was runner up.

A significant number of our players and officials went on to be named in State and National squads/teams. The BSA continues to be very proud of our representative players but this year, in particular, the number of younger players involved in the Queensland Heat team for the first time was also a highlight for the BSA.

Not only do we produce quality players, our coaches, managers, umpires and statisticians continue to excel by participating in State, National and International tournaments.



Publicity & Promotion

Media

BSA enjoys ongoing support from local newspapers with articles featured from time to time. Softball, as a sport, finds it difficult to get any penetrating coverage but, having said that, our Play 4 a Cure, Yellow Socks Softball Challenge continues to get good media both on television, on mainstream radio and in The Courier Mail. Although this is primarily due to the use of high profile ex-Bronco players but the exposure is valuable none-the-less (see events).

Facilities

In order to facilitate a permanent skinned second diamond, the BSA traded two grass diamonds with the Brisbane Women's Hockey Association in a kind-for-kind negotiation. This means that we now operate only 16 diamonds at Downey Park which include the following:

- 1 International skinned diamond under lights
- 1 Senior skinned diamond under lights
- 8 Senior diamonds
- 6 Junior diamonds

Other facilities include:

- Canteen and BBQ
- Bar and "pig pen" area
- Mobile food cart (servicing our outer diamonds)
- Grandstand
- Umpire's Room
- Queensland Heat Gym and Administration room
- Hall for hire
- BSA Administration area and Board Room
- Representative Team Administration Room
- Events Administration area

We also offer a high quality batting cage facility to Clubs, teams and individuals on a for hire basis. The on-site Leading Edge Pro Shop continues to prove successful, providing softball equipment and clothing services to players and officials.

BSA also now operates the venue at O'Callaghan Park, Zillmere.

Events

A number of our usual events were cancelled this year for weather or other reasons. Those that did go ahead include:

Summer and Winter Brisbane Bash Slow Pitch – Well over 60 players in six teams in both the summer and winter months participated in two separate slow pitch competitions. It was very pleasing to see the games played in the right spirit with laughter and some interesting interpretations of rules as well as softball "skills" on display. Some players returning after a few years in retirement showed the 'still had it' and some were even swayed into playing again. A good promotion, a good competition and a good time.

This social side of softball is a growing area and one the BSA will continue to support and invest in.

BSA Rep Night – Our successful night recognising all of our BSA representatives happened again with more than 120 parents and players attending.

ANZAC Day Challenge – The BSA Men's Sub-Committee once again organised the annual "Australia" v "New Zealand" games on ANZAC day. Players from the land of the long white cloud try every year to beat the Aussies and, unfortunately, sometimes succeed. Again it is not the result that counts but the recognition of what the event symbolises and the spirit in which the games are played, especially this year. A good crowd supported the games and the funds raised go back into supporting the Men's competition at Zillmere.

Junior Presentation night – Awards for our junior grades saw over 100 junior players and parents attend.

Brisbane also played host to:

Technical Areas

Coaching –

This year the BSA again put the spot light on coaching across the park from grassroots to elite. Our hard working Coaching Coordinator, Michelle Waller, former Queensland player and dual June Spice medallist worked with others in our Development Team to run clinics. Working with Hall of Famer and Olympic Coach Bob Crudgington, the team ran another six week battery coaching / player development program. Initiatives include an on-line coaching portal, a coach mentor program and a coaching forum for coaches at all levels to share their ideas, experience and issues.

Governance –

Following last year's strategic planning processes, the BSA continued to review our operations and policies. The Constitution, By-Laws and Ground Rules were all reviewed and improved.

Scoring –

The Brisbane Scoring community continues to represent the Association at all levels of Softball.

We are very fortunate to have such a passionate and dedicated group of statisticians and we would like to thank them for their time and support throughout the 2014/15 year. Below are just some of their achievements.

2014 – 15 Clinics

Some very successful Level 1, 2 and 3 clinics were run in February/March 2015. The demand for clinics seems to be cyclic, with every second year providing the maximum interest.

We are also planning to offer a one-day clinic in iScore. This is not an accredited scoring clinic but is sanctioned by the SQI Scoring Directorate. Given the interest within BSA and the encouragement of BSA representative statisticians to use iScore, the timing is appropriate.

Support

We would like to acknowledge the support provided to the Association by Joy Leach. Joy lectured the Level 1, 2 and 3 clinics that were organised and provides invaluable advice and support to the BSA scoring fraternity.

Accredited Scorers

Keeping track of accredited scorers within BSA remains to be a difficult task as SAL still has a backlog of completed exam results to process. However, this situation is improving. Our best estimate of the list at April 2015 is as follows:

- Level 1 - 26
- Level 2 - 9
- Level 3 - 4
- Level 4 and above - 6

Representative Scoring

BSA scorers continue to represent the Association at a Queensland level. Chris Bailey was the official statistician for the Queensland Heat team both at the National Championships and the Southern Cross Challenge. Deb Maloney and Wendy Harries also commenced their Queensland scoring careers by scoring for the Queensland U15 Girls and U15 Boys National Championships respectively.

Furthermore, we have a number of scorers offering up their spare time to oversee National Tournaments as Official Statisticians. This year, volunteers included Fiona Goffer, Jason Collins, Deb Moloney and Wendy Harries.

Pick-up Scorers

Once again, BSA scorers were able to assist less well staffed DAs by acting as Pick-up Scorers at State Championships. Thank you to Deb Maloney and Wendy Harries for making themselves available to assist the other Associations.

Umpiring –

Once again another successful year for the 3

Umpires of the BSUA. This year's Redshirt program saw two new umpires attaining their Level 1 accreditation. BSUA had two Level 2 Umpires who will hopefully progress to Level 3 later this year (2015).

Helen Strauss was recently awarded her SAL Level 7 accreditation. This level is awarded in recognition of Helen's contribution to SAL both on and off the Diamond. Internationally, Helen was the first Australian female umpire to be awarded the Gold Medal game (plate) at a World Series. Helen will be BSA's first Level 7 accredited Umpire, having originally started her Umpiring career as a Redshirt umpire at BSA.

Janelle Hicks and Jamie Harries have both been selected in the latest ISF Development Squad.

BSA Club Competitions – Number of games Umpired:

- 2014 BSA Men's Winter Comp – 137 games (Plates and Bases combined total)
- 2014-15 BSA Women's Summer Comp – 434 games (Plates and Bases combined total)

BSUA Umpires officiated at all State Championships, including U17 Boy's and U19 Men's, either as Umpires and/or Examiners. We also had three Umpires attend National Championships. We also supplied many of the umpires who assisted with the ADF games.

Of course, any of these competitions could not be conducted without the assistance of the club people who volunteer to umpire games during the season. This is a thankless task, and we recognise just how hard it is to get people to meet these commitments. Without the support of these people many games would not be played.

Lastly BSUA would like to acknowledge the support of the Umpires from outside of BSA who provide us with the opportunity to cover more games and occasional work three umpire systems on games other than the A1 competition.

Player Development

Thanks to a very active sub-committee, and a grant from the State Government, player development has continued to be at the forefront for BSA.

Swing Into Softball

What a hit! The parents loved it, the kids loved it and the skill improvement over the season was highly evident. So much so that we thought it time to showcase the kids and held a special session on a Friday night before two A grade games. With the A grade players and supporters in the crowd cheering them on, our SIS kids put on a highly skilled show and loved being on the big diamond! We replicated this on grand final day where the show was put on for the crowd before the A1



Grand final and the kids could then form a guard of honour for our grand final teams.

This year, we moved to a coach for every 4-5 kids meaning more effort could be given to one child at any time. Overseen by BSA president, the coaches Morgan, Kylie, Becky and Leslie worked well together but more importantly with the children. Using the drills from the Softball Community Coaching program and often adlibbing the kids were constantly on the move and never stopped learning.

Post season the coaches discussed the potential of each child and recommended directly to the parents what we believe the children should do next year. SIS will continue to be the introduction for kids into softball and next year we will deliver SIS Amateur. Same concept but more game based with coach pitching (but again and importantly, no midweek training). Some of our kids, whilst young we believe will be capable of playing in the U13B competition. The beauty of assessing on skill, not age!

We can definitely say that SIS in year 2 at BSA was a success and we look forward to seeing what the future holds.

Talent Identification Athlete Support Program

Our SQI talent program continues for our Association to prepare our players involved in SQI talent programs. This four week initiative offered access to specialty coaches who assisted batting, base running, fielding, pitching and catching. It is designed to have the players prepared for physical skill work as well as help to avoid injuries (shoulders in particular) for those not involved in a Winter Club competition. We are seeing a lot more players playing the winter competition which is helping their game sense and skill level.

Battery Clinic

As described under the Coaching section, the BSA has introduced an annual Battery Clinic to provide coaches and players with a six week clinic which focuses on the coaching methodology of pitching and catching in order to improve the quality of performance and training practice methods. The opportunity for existing and emerging battery players to receive high quality coaching during the clinic combined with the ongoing legacy provided by the enhanced competence of club coaching should lead to a greater number of quality pitchers and catchers in our competition. The session was opened up to all Associations and we had a great response. This program was very successful with the combined efforts of our Coaching Coordinator and Bob Crudgington. Bob is well placed to facilitate this program as a dual Olympic Coach (1996/2000) and academic leader in sports coach development with the University of Queensland. Our follow up four week program will occur over the 2015 winter season to assess the initial clinic and follow up with skills that our coaches have learned

and put into motion through coaching.

Coaches Corner

Our coaching coordinator along with the development team are putting in place more coaching opportunities for our club coaches for the upcoming 2015/16 season. Building on the coach mentoring opportunities provided across all program, club coaches are set to access short clinics throughout the season to enhance their coaching skills and game knowledge. Coach accreditation courses will also feature as part of this. We have also this year have identified another Coaching Coordinator Tyson Howard to work with Michelle Waller and our Development staff. The primary goal is to have another person with rep experience to be able to assess our rep coaches throughout their team preparation, be available to help run practices and provide feedback on hand and debrief these coaches after their State Title appearance.

Regional Academy

Our Regional Academy has become three-fold!

Our U15 Regional Academy consists of girls who have been selected to our Brisbane Red and White teams. Specialist coaching and SQI testing are run through this program. We also include our "Diamond Development" players in our Academy so that they have access to specialist coaching, a number of games and conclude with our Deb McColm shield. Unfortunately this did not occur due to rain and a one day game play was set up with other Associations and played at Redlands allowing our young athletes the opportunity to put all their skills into action. More inter-association games next year will only benefit softball as a whole. Being involved in Academy allows these girls to know what is expected of them when they step into a role on the Red or White team.

Our Regional Academy coaches along with the U15 Qld Regional Coach Tony Nolan implemented a preparation program for the athletes that made the U15 Qld Regional teams for their National Tournament. The program ran for nine weeks to prepare them for the physical and mental aspects of attending a one week tournament. Players worked on batting, base running, fielding, pitching and catching.

Our Development team ran a four week program for any girls who missed out on selection in our U17 and U19 teams. These sessions allowed the girls to gain feedback from specialist coaches to help them further their skills, encourage them to keep working on the areas of their play and link them up with other Association teams to participate at State Championships.

Further to the above we have now implemented a relationship with the UQ Sport Academy at the University of Queensland and have had access to

a strength and conditioning coach who has come on board with our U15 program to work on their speed and strength primarily for base running but overall identifying what areas we can improve on to benefit all of our Rep teams. A program booklet will be available for all of our rep coaches to implement a strong warm up routine and also a session with the coaches and players to identify areas of improvement and skills to introduce during their sessions.

Association Future Plans & Objectives

The most pressing need of the BSA is to work with local and state government to minimise the damage that can be caused by flood waters. Our diamonds and equipment have been inundated too many times in recent years for us to allow this to continue.

We are working hard to continue to develop our skinned diamonds and make our grassed surfaces as safe as possible. We seem to always be at one of the extremes, too little rain or too much! In addition, the challenge of sharing our surfaces with another sport does have an impact at times but a good relationship with our neighbours and a better understanding of each other's needs is helping.

Like all Associations, we are concerned about numbers and we will be working with our clubs to have a collective effort to recruit and retain players and officials in coming years. Importantly, we need to recognise the attracting of other forms of softball be it slow pitch or sevens or some other variant and devote more resources to embedding the formats into our calendar.

BUNDABERG

Membership

The 2014/15 Season saw 5 clubs and 24 teams play in a competitive competition in 5 divisions. We also had 60 T-Ballers who participated in a non-competitive program. The total number of players for the season was 155 junior players and 165 senior players. This was about 30 players down from last season, mainly being juniors. This is especially evident in the 14, 15, 16, 17 year age group.

Sponsorship & Grants

We are currently working on a Sponsorship Program to get some sponsors. The end of February concluded our grant money from the Queensland Government for the Sport and Recreation Officer's position. A number of local businesses did provide support through donations of food for hosting the Queensland Primary Schoolgirls and Wide Bay Carnivals and fundraising activities.

Highlights

Bundaberg hosted the Queensland Primary School Girls State Championship in August 2014. This was attended by 12 regional teams from all over Queensland playing softball for 4 full days. In March 2015 we hosted the Wide Bay Regional Softball trials where 11 district teams competed.

We continue to send Representative teams away to all State Championships. Our Under 15 Boys team were runners up in the President's Cup at the recent U15 Boys State Championship 2015. The U19 Men's team were Runners Up and Best Defensive Team at the U19 Men's State Championship. The U17 Boys team was the winner of the Presidents' Cup. Many of these teams were combined with Hervey Bay and Maryborough Associations due to each Association being unable to fill their own teams.

A number of our junior players gained selection in Queensland Teams – Ella Cedergreen, Riley O'Neill and Kyle Lyster (U15 Development teams), Brennan Dempsey (U17, U19 and Australian U19 Men's Squad), Mitchell Silcox (U19 Men) and Tyrell Priestley (U23 Men and Australian U19 Men's team). Also Joy MacPherson (Coach) and Leanne Harvey (Scorer) went as officials with the U15 Development teams.

Our new website was set up thanks to Eric Drabwell and Nicole Findley. It worked very well. At the Annual General Meeting held in June a new Management Committee was elected and new management processes began. This has had some challenges for all those involved.

Publicity, Promotion

Thanks to Eric Drabwell, Bundaberg has received huge amounts of publicity and media coverage throughout the year. Weekly talk on radio, constant newspaper coverage, television reports have all been beneficial. As well our new website and Facebook page are constantly being used by everyone. Eric has also put together a sponsorship package to gain sponsors.

Technical Areas

Umpiring –

Our annual level 1 Umpiring Examination was held in May 2014. Our umpiring group continue to work hard to encourage new umpire to gain their accreditation.

Coaching –

In October 2015 a Level 1 Coaching Accreditation Course was conducted for 20 participants. It is planned to hold a Level 2 in July 2015.

Scoring –

Scoring courses are planned prior to the 2015/16 season commencing.

Junior Development

5 Bundaberg Softball continued to supply coaches to conduct Active After School Programs in 5 primary



schools. Darrin Hebditch came and ran some pitching and batting clinics in September. A couple of clubs ran some holiday sessions for junior players.

We changed the format of our Junior Competition to a more ability based competition and even changed the name of some of our divisions in line with the Swing into Softball Program. Our T-Ballers participated in a fun, skills and games program mixed all in together. But separate junior and senior sessions depending on ability levels.

Facilities

There are 4 diamonds with varying surfaces, grass and partly skinned running tracks. There has been an underground watering system put on 2 diamonds, with the other 2 to be done in the near future.

New Innovations

Plan to complete BBQ area, new fencing around diamonds and shade sails.

Future

Other sports starting and finishing times of season continue to make an impact. We began our 2014/15 season a couple of weeks later and finished a couple of weeks earlier to see if this would make any difference to numbers of people playing. A number of families did comment it relieved some stress.

We are looking to do some top dressing of diamonds and outfielders. Complete BBQ area, new fencing, painting and complete shade sails.

The management committee has some work to do in relation to updating policies and procedures and ensuring clubs are accepting and understanding of the new management structure and decision making processes.

We are hosting the Primary Boys State Softball Championship in August. We are also looking at conducting a T-Ball competition the long weekend in January. We are also constantly trying to find new ways to encourage new players and plan to hold a slow pitch competition in the off season.

Promotion & Advertising

CSSA was in the public promoting our sport, whether it is in a shopping centre, Sports Expos, Sign On Come & Try Days, pre-season flyers to all Schools in the MBRC, have all gained additional club membership

CSSA established and maintained a successful long term relationship with local Newspapers with reports of games, junior and senior photographs, draws and results appearing on a weekly basis. The Sports Editor has shown a strong interest in and understanding of Softball and coverage of week-end games .

Forever approaching School based contacts, trying to get softball back into the local schools, encouraging the teachers and volunteers to help softball gain a prominent interest in inter-school sport & utilising the grounds at Dances Road as a means to develop a strong and open relationship coordinating sporting camps and workshops.

Special Olympics Program

Introducing and supporting the opportunities for disability, indigenous & other cultures to participate. CSSA are building on existing programs for the long term goal for the Special Olympics Program to be provided in regions of Queensland.

This program has provided for a foundation of competition to be held as part of the Southern Cross Challenge and for Special Olympics QLD (SOQ) to enter a softball team in the Australian Special Olympics Program. CSSA working alongside 3 other District Associations partnered with SQI and SOQ to provide the opportunities for the participants to try softball.

Active After School Program

Involvement to the Active After School Program has shown in increase to juniors within 9 schools

Technical Areas

CSSA encourage our members to increase their abilities and attain or upgrade their accreditations for Coaching, Scoring and Umpiring, with the aim to empower our members with knowledge and information on the game. Accreditation levels required to provide a bigger pool for CSSA State Representative duties.

The 2014/15 CSSA season was an extremely successful year with CSSA members attaining accreditations

Junior Development Programs

Technical Coordinators with the assistance of SQI

special guests presenters introduce programs to prepare our players in Battery, Base Running, Fielding, Pitching and Catching. The opportunity for existing and emerging players to receive high quality coaching to lead to a greater number of quality players within CSSA competition.

Players and Coaches are invited to attend various Clinics which focus on the coaching methodology of core techniques in order to improve the quality of performance and training practice methods.

Membership

At the close of the 2013/14 season, CDSA was in the unenviable position of having only 88 members. The association was on the verge of collapse and had been so for the past 3+ years. This year, through a lot of hard work, changes to the executive committee and a different approach to recruitment, we have increased our membership to 185 members for the 2014/15 season. A number we are extremely proud of and hope to continue to grow.

The 2014/15 season saw the inclusion of two new clubs outside the Cairns metropolitan area. Both of these clubs, from Cardwell, travelled 2 hours each way to play in the Cairns summer competition. We also saw the creation of the first softball club from Port Douglas who will join the competition next season, the return to playing for a former team and one of our existing teams growing to include juniors.

Registration numbers are still increasing as we are yet to commence our winter midweek season and are expecting additional numbers. At the time of writing, the membership breakdown was as follows:

CDSA nominated Elizabeth Fleischfresser (Liz Fresser), for the Softball Queensland 2014 Coach of the Year award. Liz's many coaching roles last season included Head Coach North Queensland Regional Academy, CDSA Coaching Director, CDSA Open Women's Head Coach, CDSA U15 Girls Head Coach, QLD U17 Girls Assistant Coach, QLD U19 Women's Friendship Series Head Coach, Peninsula U19 Girls Head Coach, and QLD Primary Schools Head Coach. Softball Queensland agreed that Liz was the most deserving nominee and she was awarded this honour at the 2014 SQI Awards dinner.

This season CDSA ran Fastpitch for open and secondary schools divisions on Saturday afternoons. All open teams played each other

through the year, splitting into two divisions for the final series. We ran a midweek Fastpitch division for the first time in 3 years. The results were:

Publicity & Promotion

CDSA is well supported by the local News Ltd publication, The Cairns Post. Whenever our members achieve representative honours, they are featured in the sports section of the paper. With the inclusion of teams from Cardwell in the CDSA competition, softball publicity is being distributed by the Cardwell Rainforest & Reef Visitors Information Centre.

This year, CDSA was lucky enough to have Curtis Pitt, Queensland Treasurer, Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations, and Minister for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships, agree to be the association's patron. Curtis' support has been immeasurable and we are extremely lucky that this support is ongoing. Curtis threw the first pitch in the Saturday Fastpitch 1 Grand Final. A slow motion and normal speed video of this was published on Facebook. The videos were widely viewed by many within the softball community and beyond.

We are fortunate enough to be supported by Chris Lodge Photography. Chris attends fixtures at varying times through the year and takes high quality action shots of our matches. These images are then made available to all CDSA members via his Facebook page at no cost as long as we acknowledge him as the photographer. This form of promotion of softball has been wonderful. Chris photographs many other sports in the area and has a large following on Facebook. Consequently, the softball images are seen by many people outside the local softball community.

CDSA received some less favourable press, when the results of the court proceedings between CDSA and our former association treasurer were completed. Our treasurer stole over \$16 000 of association funds. We successfully pursued her through the court system. She received a sentence of 18 months imprisonment (14 months of this was suspended) and was ordered to repay the full amount taken. She appealed the severity of this sentence and her appeal was upheld. On appeal, the sentence was fully suspended less the time already served and the restitution order was cancelled. This is extremely disappointing and we are currently investigating our rights to pursue this mat-

ter through the civil court system.

Technical Areas

Umpiring –

CDSA ran two practical umpiring sessions for club umpires which were well attended. Damien Hindmarsh completed his level 1 umpiring accreditation and attended the U15 State Championships.

Coaching –

In October, Cairns ran the SCCP & Presenters courses for 5 local coaches and 3 coaches from the Live Learn Leap program. The SCCP course was run again May for 17 Cape York communities who will return to their communities to run softball programs. Tayla Jackson and Lydia Nestor completed their level 1 accreditation and are presently working towards their level 2.

Scoring –

No development, programs or accreditation was performed by CDSA for scorers.

Junior Development

CDSA ran the Swing into Softball program over the 2014/15 summer season and attracted nearly 40 participants, easily our most successful junior development program in many years. Batter Up programs were run in Tully and Cardwell. School Clinics were run at Mission Beach and Cardwell schools. The new Cardwell clubs have greatly assisted in this development and Cardwell Strikers are looking to extend their club to include a junior team for the 2015/16 season.

The North Queensland Regional Academy has grown to include 6 players from the Townsville area.

November saw CDSA travel to Normanton to deliver softball clinics as part of the Live Learn Leap programs' "5 Sport Initiative Coaching Course". This course was extended to be 6 sports when CDSA again joined the program and travelled to Cooktown in March for more softball development clinics.

Over half of the participants of the Swing into Softball program this season were boys. CDSA needs to develop our boys and men's competitions to ensure that these players have a pathway to keep them playing softball.

Facilities

The CDSA softball grounds are currently located as part of the Martyn Street Sporting Reserve Complex. This facility contains 4 diamonds, one of which is a fully skinned international standard diamond. Cairns Regional Council is in the process of developing a major sporting complex at Walker



Road, Edmonton and provision is being made to locate softball at this venue. The summer 2014/15 season was the last to be held at Martyn Street.

Future

CDSA has been working with SQI to update and realign our constitution and by-laws. As a consequence, we have voted to rename our association. From the 2015/16 season onwards we will be known as Softball FNQ. This name better reflects that the association caters for softball from Cardwell to Cape York, the Torres Strait islands and west, an area in excess of 300,000km². The association will maintain the yellow, light blue, black and white colours with the representative teams competing as Softball FNQ rather than Cairns.

The biannual Great Barrier Reef Masters Games will be held in Cairns this year. The games will run in August for the final time before moving to April/May for the 2017 event. Planning is well underway and we have already seen a growth in registered teams compared to the 2013 numbers. This is extremely encouraging given that we are still three months out from commencing the event. Significant promotion has been done throughout the Cape York communities which we are hoping will be well represented. Teams from overseas and interstate have also registered their intention to attend.

The Great Barrier Reef Masters Games will be the last softball to be held at the Martyn Street Reserve, the traditional home of softball in Cairns centrally located close to the CBD. Martyn Street is being redeveloped to expand the adjoining Netball facility and the resulting configuration does not allow enough space for softball fixtures to continue at this venue. As previously mentioned, Cairns Regional Council is creating a new sporting precinct at Walker Road in the southern Cairns suburb of Edmonton. The current plans for this venue contain provisions for 3 softball diamonds, one fully lit and skinned to international standards. The remaining two will have lighting to a training level.

The Walker Road Precinct is expected to be available for the Summer 2017/18 softball season. For the two softball seasons between now and then, Cairns Regional Council is facilitating temporary accommodation at a grass hockey complex in Woree, also a southern Cairns suburb for our weekend competitions. They are still locating a venue with sufficient lighting for our midweek fixtures. Council have assured us that we will not bear any financial costs associated with this temporary relocation. The move to a new venue, and temporary accommodation at a third and fourth venue are a major risk to the continued growth of the association. It is expected that there will be local players who will not be willing to move with us to Woree and then on to Edmonton. Conversely,

Edmonton is a growth suburb with many young families and the association is hopeful of accessing this potential player pool. The committee is working hard to make this transition as smooth as possible so as to keep any loss of membership to a minimum.

This season has seen the incorporation of the first Port Douglas Softball Club. They are busily training and preparing for inclusion in fixtures in the Summer 2015/16 season. Port Douglas is approximately 45 minutes North of Cairns. The distance was considered a barrier for inclusion in a competitions held only in Cairns. The inclusion of a team from Cardwell, approximately 2 hours South of Cairns, has opened the minds of the CDSA committee to look further afield for teams. There has been interest expressed for a team to be based in Mossman, approximately 1 hour North of Cairns. The CDSA committee is hopeful that the 2015/16 season will see fixtures scheduled at the newly acquired softball grounds in Cardwell as well as Port Douglas, if they are ready in time. It is hoped that this will further assist in the development and growth of softball in these towns.

Softball in Cairns has emerged from a dark period with theft of funds and declining numbers threatening its very existence. The traditional model for running the competition has been abandoned in order to survive. Covering a North/South distance of over 1600kms means that a single site for the competition is not viable if we wish to continue and to grow. We know it will take us some years to achieve but, ultimately, it is hoped that the future Softball FNQ will consist of a series of competitions, located in the larger towns with teams from the surrounding smaller towns all travelling to their nearest town to compete. We have a large number of indigenous communities in our catchment and as such we believe this model is achievable.

GLADSTONE



Membership

Our membership numbers were slightly down from last year. We believe this is mostly because Gladstone is such a transit town where people come and go depending on the construction work. Our total registration numbers for last season was 200 + 40 registered Oz Pitch players. Our teams consisted of 5 ladies, 2 men's, 3 U15, 3 U13, 7 T-Ball, Batter up & Diamond Ball.

Sponsorship & Grants

As our association now has all financials compliant, we have this past year applied for a number of grants, both local council and local government. We were shortlisted for both but unfortunately not successful with either. We will continue to pursue submitting for grants in the upcoming year.

This year each of our representative teams secured sponsors. This was a great help to all players and families with the funds paying for uniforms. We would like to have a sponsor come on board for our regional academy this season. This would allow us to purchase new equipment required to run the academy training at a high standard.

Highlights

This year again consisted of many highlights for our association with players representing our association at different levels within our sport:

- Our U17 boy's teams played in Ipswich and came home State Champions.
- We combined U19 Boys with the Rockhampton team and won Presidents Cup.
- Gladstone also had a men's team play at Redlands this past year. Our team did not come home with any silverware, however it was a significant competition for us as for the first time we had three of our young men play in this team.
- Our U15 Boys went away to defend their title of State Champions, however were piped at the post and came home Runners Up.
- We also had our U15 Girls play in Mackay and came home with not only the Presidents Cup but also the Country Cup Champions Trophy.

This year again we had a number of players selected to play for QLD in the National Championships and the Friendship Series in their respective age groups. Continuing to build our Association in a diverse way, we have had a number of members get accreditations for scoring and had juniors go away as assistant coaches with representative teams.

Our Oz Pitch competition was a highlight as all teams enjoyed it and have returned with new players for this season's competition.

Publicity & Promotion

We have continued to work closely with our local paper to keep our sport highlights recognised. We have team highlights and scores printed each week and they also do write ups about our junior players or teams and also about any significant happenings for our rep players. Our representative players are always thrilled to have their playing shirts presented to them by our Mayor and their sponsors.

Our Facebook page has been a great way for us to spread the word of our sport and also keep in touch with our members on a day to day basis.

Technical Areas

Coaching –

We have had the same coaches as last year, with increased assistance from parents to help out with the large number of T-Ball teams. We also had

some of our U15 players help out with coaching the T-Ballers.

Scoring –

We continue to promote this area of the sport as it is another area that has a limited amount of interest. However we are happy that we now have a number of levelled scorers and others interested in learning.

Umpiring –

We have over the past two years had the same three young men helping out umpiring our U15 games. This year was no different and seen them be acknowledged by being presented with gift vouchers for their contribution. We hope to encourage new players to help in this area next year and will continue to encourage our U15's to keep up the good work being done with umpiring our U13 games.

Junior Development

For an association of relatively small numbers, we are proud that we are continuing to support new players, up and coming players as well as our experienced players by using this diversity to form representative teams. We believe that developing our up and coming players and training them to a high standard for rep teams has been the reason why we have been able to continue to have teams play in each age level at State competitions. Our belief is not to send a representative team away to win but to have a team that have a go and build on what they learn for the following year.

We continued to have great numbers in our Diamond Ball, Batter Up and then moving into T-Ball. Again this year we had a lot of the Diamond Ballers and Batter Up player's transition into T-Ball.

We have worked on our junior academy this year, however with limited availability of coaches to take on this role, we have not been able to run it at the level we would have hoped. This is something our committee is working on and hope we can have this sorted for this coming season.

Facilities

The makeover on the club house has made a big difference. We have now also finished the makeover on the inside of the office with new tiles and a lick of paint and we are now working on new furniture for the area. The canteen has also had a facelift with a coat of paint throughout.

The fencing around diamond one has been replaced, this making our spectators area safer. Our continued partnership with the local council to keep the diamonds upkeep at a high level has paid off. Our grounds are looking fantastic and we have noticed the difference with the playing surfaces.

New Innovations & Future

Our hope moving forward is to be successful with



some of our grant applications so we can upgrade our lighting to diamond one.

Last year was the first time our association had leased out our canteen. Because the staff is able to focus on running the canteen and not having to have it maned between games by members, we have all enjoyed the quality and variety of fresh food available. It is something the association is more than happy to continue through the foreseeable future.

This past year has seen many changes for our association and seen it be bought up to standard on many different levels. We hope to continue to build numbers with in our association for both players and also volunteers to help continue to build the sport in the community.

Sponsorship & Grants

Facilities

The SMI complex in Searle St, Maryborough is dedicated to Softball and contains four senior and two junior diamonds. Improvements made during 2014/15 included:

- installing playground equipment, new player and spectator seating and shade structures; and

Noosa

We have weathered some highs and lows this Summer season – the highs include having 5 players selected in Queensland teams and the incredible low, in January, with the sudden passing of our friend and Slammers Club President, Darren Lange. While we all felt the loss of Darren, it was his family and his Slammers club that felt it the most. In true Slammers style they rallied and against the odds, Darren's team won the U13 B grade final which was a lovely way for them to finish the season. Well done to everyone involved. Each year we hold an U13 inter-club carnival which has now been named the Darren Lange Memorial Cup.

Membership

Ten years ago our 8 diamonds were full of players in every time slot on a Saturday morning and our 5 Clubs fielded multiple teams in each grade and still had bench players. Now our juniors consist of 2 x T-Ball, 4 x U13, 4 x U15 and 2 x U17 teams out of 4 Clubs. Even more surprising is that that includes 15 new juniors this year. So how has it gone so terribly wrong in the past 10 years?

The fact that softball has been left out of the Olympics may be a reason for the Brisbane based Associations, but has very little impact on us. Our biggest problem is that there is no industry in Noosa, other than hospitality and families have to move away to find work. Our own children, once they finish school, have to move away to go to university or to find work.

While our numbers dwindle we enter a catch twenty-two. Our elite players leave our small Association and head to Redcliffe or Brisbane for better competition. On one hand this is understandable, but on the other we can never increase our competition if these players get to a certain point and then leave, and our competition standard is weakened even further.

players are leaving at U13 and U15 age groups.

Facilities

We are grateful recipients of a Sports Field Maintenance Grant from Noosa Council which allows us to keep our playing fields in good condition. Our Groundsman, Fred Thiess works tirelessly on all areas of the grounds to keep up appearances and to fix anything and all done with a smile. Congratulations and thank you to Fred, the well-deserved recipient of NDSA Volunteer of the Year.

A small group of dedicated volunteers battled heat and a downpour, over the Christmas break, to spruce up the undercover area of the clubhouse

with some new paint work. Thanks team, it was fun too. With last year's successful OLGR grant we have installed a batting cage with removable netting. Thanks go to Warren King, for his knowledge, and his team of helpers who managed to get it all done in time for the acquittal.

Junior Development

Combined training afternoons were offered for all players throughout the season. Our training aids were well used for fun, practical and educational sessions. Academy and other interested players were welcome any/all afternoons for training sessions with Richard Wakeham. Richard gives his time freely to all players regardless of their club and his work is paying off for as we see improvements and state selections.

New Innovations

Early in the December school holidays we offered a day to the Tewantin State School After School Care Program. This was a successful test run, with 60 children and their 6 carers attending. We offered a morning session of skill stations manned by Noosa coaches and players, followed by T-Ball games in the afternoon. We provided morning and afternoon tea and charged a small amount per child. We gained a few new members and enquiries for next season, as well as earning a little bit of money. We intend to run a couple of these days again in 2015 during the school holidays in the lead up to our season. The feedback we received from the Carers and parents was all very positive.

A lot has been said about our seniors mixed fastpitch over the past few years. We tried slowpitch and 5 aside softball and variations of both but our members wanted what they wanted. So we sought our own insurance and ran our own mixed fastpitch competition.

After a controversial safety audit by our Risk Management Officer, prior to this season, which nearly had her hung from the nearest tree, her recommendations were eventually implemented and changes were made such as:

- There was no competition – no points awarded and no finals and some games were not even scored.
- Major safety aspects were put in place particularly for the women and new players, with men toning down their competitiveness and a "safety run home line" was introduced.

The only reason I am mentioning our seniors is because without them, and the money generated by them, our small Association may not have survived. But we found a way to survive. Our small

numbers in juniors was not enough to sustain or grow our Association and we found that we had to give our members what they wanted. We did a survey about single sex games/competition. The results showed that if we only offered single sex games we wouldn't have enough numbers for 2 teams each of males and females. Yet we could get 8 teams in a mixed non-competitive, family orientated social game. Sometimes you have to take a chance especially when your survival depends on it.

Future Challenges

- retaining members and attracting new ones
- easing the work load on committee members
- keeping running costs down
- Repair, refit and standardisation of diamond lighting to allow for social night ball
- Break ins and vandalism

These challenges are almost the same as last year and we are working on several, such as retaining and attracting members and keeping the running costs down. Easing the work load is a constant struggle but with some new faces on the committee alongside the couple of residual ones, and new people putting up their hands to help, the ease may come. Our lighting will require a large grant and will be something we look at in conjunction with providing more undercover areas. Once again this year we have been hit with break-ins, even with beefed up security doors, lighting and alarms. The position of our clubhouse is the main problem as we are tucked away out of sight with a large area of bush to the side.

Plans

Our immediate plans for the off season are:

- The finalisation of the incorporation of all clubs
- The accreditation of all coaches
- An update of our Constitution

Our long term plans are for the refurbishment of our clubhouse, a large undercover area and field lighting.

The work on upgrading our diamonds and facilities is constant and ongoing.

 - Installed set-in bases on the 3 diamonds that weren't installed in 2014
- Fixed damage on all fences around the diamonds

New Innovations

- Successful Softball Batter-Up Program held at the beginning of the season which has led to a successful Swing Into Softball Program.

Future

- Plan to increase junior numbers enough over the next 12-18 months using Swing Into Softball Program to develop into a Junior Fastpitch Competition.

State Championships
